#### **MERREDIN CELEBRATES 10 YEARS**

The Shire of Merredin has received the 10 Year Waterwise Councils Award at Water Corporation's 2024 Waterwise Recognition Awards held on 8 May 2024. This accolade celebrates a decade of dedication to sustainable water practices, highlighting the Shire's commitment to building a climate-resilient and waterwise community.

The Waterwise Council Program, a collaboration between Water Corporation and the Department of Water and Environmental Regulation, supports local governments in adopting waterwise strategies crucial for facing climate change and decreasing rainfall across WA.

Merredin is one of 57 waterwise aquatic centres in WA, which have collectively saved 1.59 billion litres of water since the program began.

#### CBD REDEVELOPMENT PROJECT UPDATE



In Apex Park, the posts for the flying fox have been successfully installed, along with a number of play elements. Significant advancements have also been made on the skate park, with the concrete work around the top of the bowl now complete, as well as a number of ramps.

The set-out for the half-court has also been finalised and surfacing is scheduled to commence in the coming weeks. Additionally, we are eagerly awaiting the arrival of the remaining play equipment, which should be in Merredin shortly.

The concrete pouring of footpaths has also been largely completed.




In the Town Centre, the underground electrical installations are approaching their final stages, ensuring improved infrastructure and reliability. The new toilet block has also been completed and includes two regular toilet stalls, two ambulant stalls and one disability-accessible stall, all of which are unisex.

Drainage works have been completed, and the footings for the event stage and retaining walls have also been finalised.

Over the coming weeks, we will be bringing in large amounts of soil which will ensure the lush greenery of new trees and plants are able to thrive.

#### **NEW HOME FOR THE CWVC**

This was following an eight-week interim period at Cummins Theatre, to allow for the Train Station to undergo renovations. This move marks a significant milestone in enhancing our services and providing an improved visitor experience.

#### REVITALISATION OF APEX PARK ENTERS EXCITING NEW PHASE

The eagerly awaited transformation of Apex Park has reached an exciting milestone, as it enters its fourth month of construction. Substantial advancements have meant that the project has now entered the next phase of works, including the imminent completion of the highly anticipated Skate Park, as well as the installation of more than 20 play elements and extensive landscaping that will breathe new life into this highly valued community space.

Thanks to generous funding from Lotterywest, the Skate Park is currently undergoing a full rebuild. The revamped space will include features such as a learn to skate area, half pipe and a skate bowl, among other elements, offering a next-level skating experience.

Shire President Mark McKenzie expressed the sentiment shared by many in the Merredin community, highlighting the Skate Park's pivotal role in the park's redevelopment. "We can now see the design of the park, specifically the skate park, really coming to life, a testament to the collective vision and determination of our Council and community," remarked the Shire President.

"It's not just about ramps and rails; it's about creating a

vibrant hub where the community can come together, learn, and enjoy the space."

In addition to the skate park, the majority of the concrete footpaths have been poured this month, weaving seamlessly throughout the park to provide convenient access and connectivity for all. These pathways showcase sections of exposed aggregate, serving as distinctive visual accents that will mirror the aesthetic of the redeveloped Town Centre when complete.

Daniel Hay-Hendry, the Project Manager for the CBD Redevelopment, expressed his delight at the progress made despite the challenges posed over the last couple of years due to market fluctuations and the COVID-19 pandemic.

"After years of collaboration and planning, it's immensely gratifying to witness the fruition of a design that celebrates Merredin's unique natural history and beauty," commented Mr. Hay-Hendry.

Attention pet owners in the Shire of Merredin! Please remember to register your pets in compliance with local regulations.

Under the *Dog Act 1976*, all dogs over the age of three months must be registered. Registration can be completed at the Shire offices during normal office hours, and options are available for 1 year, 3 years, or a lifetime, starting from 1 November each year.

Similarly, the *Cat Act 2011* requires all cats over the age of six months to be registered and microchipped. Cats must also display registration tags in public places.

#### **ANZAC DAY 2024**

On Thursday, 25 April 2024, just before the first light of dawn, hundreds of community members gathered to commemorate the sacrifices and bravery of the Australian and New Zealand Armed Forces. The morning proceedings commenced with an ANZAC Day March along Barrack Street starting at the Australia Post Office, and down to the Merredin Cenotaph with the inclusion of piper Reagan Jones. Once the clock ticked over to 6:00am, the Merredin Military Cadets left the procession and assumed their positions to proudly raise the flags.

Shire President, Mark McKenzie presided over the service, which commenced shortly after dawn. He begun by welcoming and acknowledging the veterans in attendance, offering his gratitude for their service, sacrifice, and commitment to defending our freedoms, before thanking the community for braving the cold morning to pay tribute to our heroes.

The Shire President then paid a touching tribute to two local veterans who had recently passed away; Mr Eddie Johnston, WWII Veteran, and Mr. Jim Willcox, Vietnam Veteran. They were recognised for their unwavering dedication to serving the nation, and for their bravery and determination.

"They stood shoulder to shoulder with their comrades, facing the challenges of conflict with bravery and determination. As we reflect on their lives and their service, let us remember their courage, their sacrifice, and their devotion to duty. Though they may no longer be with us in person, their spirit lives on in the hearts and minds of all who knew them," the Shire President said.

Following the tribute, Mark Beagle was invited forward to lead the Lord's Prayer, before a beautiful display of wreaths was laid to honour those who sacrificed so much to fight for our country. This was then followed by the ODE recited by Aub Tompkin, The Last Post performed by Natalia Warnock from Merredin College, and the singing of both the Australian and New Zealand National Anthems by Jade Healey-Ratima.

The Dawn Service concluded shortly after, with the Shire President extending an invitation to all in attendance to attend a Gunfire Breakfast at the Tivoli, which was kindly prepared by the Merredin Men's Shed.

Later in the day, a Mid-Morning Service was held at Cummins Theatre which also attracted a large crowd of community members who wished to pay their respects. This service was led once again by Shire President Mark McKenzie, with the proceedings mimicking much of the Dawn Service, with the addition of Benjamin Townson leading the Lord's Prayer, A Choired Taste singing a beautiful rendition of the Hymn 'Amazing Grace,' and Guest Speaker Constable Cody Crisp, who filled the hearts and ears with memories he shared of his grandfather's time of service.

The Mid-Morning service concluded after a performance of 'Four Hundred Seasons,' by A Choired Taste, which was followed by a light lunch in the Tivoli made possible by the generosity of Collgar Renewables.

The Shire of Merredin would like to thank the community for their engagement with, and continued support of, the ANZAC Day events in Merredin; it is a true reflection and demonstration of the ANZAC Spirit, which will continue to be remembered and honoured by future generations to come.





# SHIRE OF MERREDIN COUNCIL OPPOSE LIVE SHEEP EXPORT BAN: CALLS FOR FEDERAL GOVERNMENT RECONSIDERATION

Shire of Merredin Councillors have voiced profound concern regarding the recent decision by our Federal Government to phase out live sheep exports by 2028.

Amid extensive media coverage, it appears that our Federal representatives have prioritised the interests of a vocal, uninformed minority over those of our farmers, with seemingly little consideration for the devastating effects on rural communities.

Questions have been raised about the rationale behind this move, given the government's commitment to supporting Australian-made industries. The Shire is concerned that the decision may be influenced by the demographic distribution of certain advocacy groups, predominantly based in urban areas, which could have affected the decision-making process.

This decree jeopardises the livelihoods of countless generations of hard-working sheep farmers statewide, while also threatening the economic stability of rural towns reliant on servicing the agricultural sector.

Shire President Mark McKenzie has conveyed the disappointment of the Councillors regarding the decision. "We [Shire of Merredin Council] believe that prioritising the interests of a minority group may not be in the best interest of rural communities," he said.

"The Shire will be penning a letter to the Minister for Agriculture, Senator Murray Watt, urging the Federal Government to reconsider this decision and continue supporting the live export industry, which meets regulatory standards and contributes significantly to the Australian economy."

#### **WESTERN POWER WORKS & OUTAGES**

Western Power is investing over \$1.2 million in infrastructure upgrades to enhance network resilience throughout Merredin.

These works will include the replacement of around 60 poles and 6.5kms of conductor, upgrading of streetlights and insulators, and other essential maintenance.

The work will be concentrated around the Merredin townsite, with the bulk of it scheduled to be completed in May and June, with minor works to follow in August to October.

Some planned power outages will be necessary to ensure the work is completed safely.

On Wednesday, 29 May 2024, there will be a power outage along Barrack Street. As such, the Central Wheatbelt Visitor Centre will be closed.



#### **NEW TOILET BLOCK**

We are pleased to announce the nearing completion of the new toilet block in the Town Centre. Constructed with durable finishes, including mod-wood external panelling, this facility has been designed for longevity and security.

To enhance passive security and deter vandalism, the new toilet block has been strategically located closer to Barrack Street. This placement also provides easier access for community members and visitors due to its proximity to shops and other community amenities.

Please note that the proximity of the toilet block to the road will be adjusted upon the completion of the intersection works. The road will be raised and narrowed, bringing the kerb line approximately 5 meters from the toilet block. This design for the road serves as a traffic calming measure, significantly slowing traffic and improving pedestrian safety.

These enhancements will greatly improve accessibility and convenience for all users, ensuring a safer and more pleasant experience for the community. We appreciate your patience and support as we complete these important upgrades.
